When I was a kid. I wanted to be like my father. When I watched him working in the garden, I wanted to plant a garden of my paragraphs own. When he was in the workshop build-

ing things, it made me want to bang on a board with my little tov hammer. When Dad preached, I wanted to do it, too! I'm sure psychologists can list a host of complex reasons why kids want to be like their parents, but I have one that is fairly simple. I believe it's because good parents have first made the investment to be like their kids. It begins when we make silly "goo -goo-ga-ga" sounds while tickling their little toes. Then when they get a bit older, we hold hands and dance in a circle singing "Ring Around the Rosies" until we flop to the floor giggling. As parents, we learn again to play hideand-seek, and to run around the yard catching fireflies on warm summer nights.

I think back to when my brother and I were in Boy Scouts and Dad would go camping with us. We'd sleep in musty old tents on hard and/or frozen ground, eating unidentifiable food amidst an endless barrage of inane adolescent stories and pranks. It was a thrill for us, but must have been excruciating for an adult. Why did Dad do it? For a little while, he became a kid as an investment in our lives. It built a precious relationship.

As Christians, it is of great importance that we strive to be like our Heavenly Father. In fact, we desire to do this. Do you know why? Because He first made the investment to become like us. John 1:14 says, "The Word became flesh and made His dwelling among us." We can never doubt God's commitment to this relationship, and we are drawn to Him like a magnet.

The English poet John Donne wrote, "Twas much, that man was made like God before; But that God should be like man, much more." In Jesus, God became like us so we could become more like Him. The best way we can honor God at Christmas is to model our lives after Jesus, who became like us. Have a blessed Christmas season!


